Significant inequalities faced by disabled children and young people: their lives still affected by the denial of their rights both by those running some services and society at large.



Our approach

- Toolkit developed to support commissioners and providers to widen their thinking and how short break support is offered
- Sought to give families greater choice and control, enhance personalisation and flexibility in short break services
- Placing families at the centre to inform market, commissioning and community developments in two Local Authorities
- Draws heavily on examples of innovative practice to inspire thinking and improvements in service delivery
- Provides examples of user led approaches and inclusive, personalised commissioning and provision



Community Development Principles

- > Seeks to empower families and communities to work in partnership
- Nothing about us without us
- Co-design and delivery of services between families and professionals
- Using communities as partners in commissioning and delivering at a neighbourhood level
- Building on and developing young people's capabilities to express their views
- Encouraging peer and community support by developing active networks
- Active development of diverse care and support market
- Increasing independence and social inclusion through opening us universal provision
- > Focus on outcomes and what children want from their lives



Effective consultation

- > Takes place at a sufficiently early stage to influence the outcome
- > Provides sufficient information to make a considered response
- Allows "adequate time" for responses
- Results in proper consideration of the responses when decisions made
- > Share what difference people's contribution has made: You Said; We Did ..



Participation: Top Tips

- > Ensure engagement purposeful and accessible : process and outcome
- Consider what info is already available to avoid repetition and duplication
- ➤ Identify what will motivate adults and children to be involved in designing and evaluating care and support services
- Utilise existing networks to support service redesign bearing in mind the need for broad representation on draft proposals
- > Recognise different audiences require different approaches

Alternative Short Break Activities and Models

- Use creative mediums to explore and expand children's interests
- Seek out providers in response to identified outcomes rather than fitting children into what exists
- > Support and educate universal providers
- Recognise and meet child and parent's need for support and reassurance to facilitate engagement in new activities
- Acknowledge the process may be slow and gradual
- Consider commissioning models that support and broker small local and community providers



Universal Inclusive Services and Access to Sport

- Support families and providers to overcome lack of confidence and fear of the unfamiliar
- ➤ Ensure young people and families are familiar with their rights under the Equality Act 2010
